PETERSBURGH Water District Renovation Plans Delivered

Tom Suozzo and another engineer from his firm Cedarwood Engineering came to the April 19 meeting of the Petersburgh Town Board to present plans for the new water treatment building at the Water District property next to the water tank. The new building is a pre-engineered metal building with LED lighting and gas heat and adequate space for the regular pumping and control equipment, the carbon filtration equipment that removes PFOA from the water and a separately enclosed chlorination room.

The plans have been submitted to the State and County health departments for approval. Suozzo said he hopes to get health department approvals within 30 days, but the time it takes for health departments to review and approve plans varies considerably, so that time frame cannot be reliably predicted. Once approved, it would be put out to bid, which usually takes about thirty days, and once the contract is awarded, the start date for construction would depend on the contractor's schedule.

The agreement with Taconic specifying the portion of the project that it will pay for has not been finalized and Supervisor Dennis Smith said he will call them to set up a meeting and he hopes to have a signed agreement within a few weeks. The project cannot be put out to bid until an agreement with Taconic is in place, since it will be paying for a significant portion of the

youth program this year. The Town did not run a program last summer because of the pandemic, and last December long-time Youth Program Director Cindy Mars declined to be re-appointed for this year. When Supervisor Dennis Smith sought to advertise for a new Youth Program Director, he could not find a job description for that position and decided that a job description was needed before the position could be filled. He asked Town Clerk Deidra Michaels to work on this and when it came up on the agenda, he asked her to speak. She said the Youth Program Director is a civil service position and candidates must pass the civil service exam before being hired. She said it is probably too late to hire a new Youth Director and have that person put together a summer program, but she said she believes the Library, the PVMCC, and the Parks and Recreation Committee could pull together a program for this summer. Heinz Noeding expressed skepticism about that idea and suggested that the ing letters of interest for the positions of President Town arrange instead to send Petersburgh kids to the Grafton Summer Program and have Petersburgh pay the fee. Grafton is accepting kids from neighboring towns for a fee of \$75 per child per week. Supervisor Smith said he would contact the Grafton Youth Program Director to make arrangements and he will contact the Berlin School District to see about arranging a bus to take kids from the Petersburgh municipal center to the Grafton Youth Program site.
