TROY **Replacing 8 Miles Of Water Lines**

The city of Troy officially broke ground on Monday, May 10 on phase one of a multi-year project to replace 8 miles of water transmission lines between the Tomhannock Reservoir and the City's Water Treatment Plant. According to Mayor Patrick Madden the goal of this major water infrastructure project is to preserve the reliability of the water supply for another 200 years.

During Phase 1 of the project, two 36 inch diameter pipes totaling 43,000 linear feet will be installed. Construction is antici-

Water Infrastructure Grant (IMG) and \$29.34 million short-term market-rate financing from the Environmental Facilities Corporation. The piping that is being replaced is over 100 years old.

Speaking at the ceremony, Mayor Madden said "I want to thank our partners on the City Council for their support, and the Department of Public Utilities for their work to make this project a reality." The proposed 2021-22 School budget for the Brunswick Central School District (Brittonkill) will go before voters on Tuesday, May 18. The spending plan totals \$26,809,812, which is an increase of 2.43% over the current year's budget. If approved, it will hike taxes by 2.75%, which is at the district's tax cap.

Most know the state tax cap is 2%, but it is actually determined by a complicated formula, so the actual number is often lower or higher. Brunswick CSD has stayed at or below the tax cap since its enactment.
