Born in Quitman, GA, Mr. Brown joined the Army in 1968 as a builder or mechanic, but in order to fill the Army's overwhelming need for ground troops, he was transferred to infantryman and shipped to regions around DaNang and Saigon. The reality of war was quickly realized his first night in Vietnam. A last minute decision by command came down, pulling him from the group he was originally assigned to and placing him with another. That night, a surprise attack hit and his original group suffered serious casualties.

Mr. Brown describes his experience in Vietnam as "bloody." He went on to describe the constant rain or humidity which made it impossible to get dry. His time in Vietnam would be cut short, when an attack would wound him. Mr. Brown survived and was awarded the Purple Heart.

After his recovery at Cam Rhan Bay, he return to the States where he worked at General Cable. He eventually moved with his wife Velma to Hoosick Falls where they raised their three children, Charlotte, James and Janell. Mr. Brown can still be seen doing yard work around the village. His soft spoken mannerisms and humble character led many in the town to have no idea he had a Purple Heart. At the Purple Heart ceremony in August of last year, being shocked to learn he was a recipient, the American Legion knew it was time for Mr. Brown to get the recognition that he deserved for his time served in Vietnam and his earning of the Purple Heart.

The American Legion invites the community to help in the placing of flags on the graves of veterans on Saturday May 29, meet at 10 am at the post. Memorial Day ceremonies will begin at 8 am at the flag pole in Wood Park. The American Legion will then offer Memorial Day rites stepping off at 8:15 am from the corner of Main St. and Wilder Ave. and march to the Shop Bridge to honor men of the Navy who lost their lives at sea. The Auxiliary will offer a prayer, the Legion will fire a volley and taps will be sounded. The Legion will honor the dead of the Civil War at Monument Park, located at the junction of Classic and High Streets. The Auxiliary will offer a prayer, the Legion will fire a volley, and taps will be sounded. The Legion will then assemble at the World War I and Veterans Memorial located in Wood Memorial Park. Wreaths will be placed at WWI, WW II, Korean and Vietnam monuments. The wreaths will be placed by the American Legion Auxiliary after a brief prayer.

The parade, under the direction of the American Legion, will assemble at 9:15 am and step off sharply at 10 am.
