Cousin H.P. Wylie Is Extremely III

Saturday, August 3, 1850: I went to Mr. Wylie's and got my cradle that he Pittsfield and carried nine bushels new had mended and I paid him for mending potatoes that average 65 cents per. I it 31 cents and I handed him two dollars trusted one and a half bushels potatoes to pay his son Simeon for helping me hay to Dr. Cluff at 60 cts per. I sold half two days, and I cradled a spell. Towards a bushel of rare ripe onions to Wells night we worked at having some. store for 25 cents. I paid 45 cents to Doctor Reed's Agricultural Store for two sisters went to Williamstown to one hundred pounds plaster. Towards commencement, and I handed John F. night John F. and his sister Sarah and two dollars to pay their expenses. This their cousin Caroline Holcomb rode to morning at two o'clock my family was Lebanon and went on Pool Hill. Today while in Pittsfield I had an invitation to taken a bleeding or puking blood and meet Colonel Ross to try to settle the twelve hundred dollars judgement that Charlotte E. holds against his son Marcellus but I did not, except for said Ross passed my house two days ago and only called to my son to have me take the trouble to come to Pittsfield.

Monday: This forenoon Mr. Gardner and Mr. Rider from Chatham came and got the 40 lambs that were before bargained at one dollar and fifty cents per head and paid the remainder fifty dollars for they had paid ten dollars in advance. I let John F. have half of the money which was thirty dollars.

Wednesday, Aug 14: I cradled wheat part of the day and I was lame with the rheumatism. Geo P. cradled some and broke the cradle, and towards night I rode over to Simeon Wylie's and left said cradle to be mended. Sarah went with me and we went to Aaron Merrils' and got cucumbers.

Thursday: I cradled oats and my two sons and Edwin hayed. Tonight John F. and Erastus Rowley went to West Sand Lake after Doctor Thomas for Henry P. Wylie for he continues bleeding to the lungs.

Friday: This forenoon I took my one horse wagon and drew in oats into my Rodgers barn and I paid Aaron Merrils 44 cents for binding up said oats. John F went to Lebanon after the grists and to Tilden's store after medicine for H. P. Wylie. Today Mr. Leonard the father of Edwin that works for me, he called and I paid him twenty dollars for the boy's services and took a receit.
