65, which seeks to pave 65 miles of county roads in 2021. The county set a record by paving 50 miles of roads in 2020.

"Our fire and ambulance companies are always ready to help those in need or facing an emergency. We are reminded every day of their outstanding service to those who live and work in Rensselaer County," said McLaughlin.

The Rensselaer County Responds fund will help ensure our volunteer fire and ambulance companies are able to continue to deliver a high level of service for our residents and respond when needed," added McLaughlin.

The funds from the Rensselaer County Responds fund will provide a one-time grant to all active volunteer and ambulance companies in the

Additional funds will also be provided by the Rensselaer County Industrial Development Agency to fire and ambulance companies to cover costs of PPE and other special materials related to response for the pandemic.

The special Rensselaer Responds funding recognizes the increased costs incurred by fire and ambulance companies during the pandemic, including loss of income from fundraising. Many fundraising activities for fire and ambulance companies were interrupted due to the COVID-19 outbreak.

'I am extremely excited and thankful to County Executive Steve McLaughlin for the implementation of this program. When I approached the County Executive about the financial pressure that volunteer agencies were facing because of COVID-19, he listened and did not

hesitate to help. Working together with Steve and his team, a support plan was established to keep our emergency first responders solvent and strong. I cannot emphasize enough the appreciation we have for the Rensselaer Responds Program," said Legislator Bruce Patire-Eagle Bridge
