30 Vaccination Clinics Planned This Summer

Rensselaer County will be hosting a number of vaccination clinics throughout the county during the summer to make vaccinations more convenient and accessible to residents, County Executive Steve McLaughlin and Public Health Director Mary Fran Wachunas have announced.

The pop-up vaccination clinics will include town concerts throughout the county, Troy Night Out and several Tri-City ValleyCats games, including the Cats' home opener on June 4.

All county pop-up clinics will feature the Johnson & Johnson one-shot vaccine.

"Rensselaer County is committed to providing vaccinations to all who want them, and this summer, we will be bringing the vaccines right to the people at many popular and well-attended events," said McLaughlin.

"Our vaccination efforts have been well-received by residents, thanks to the outstanding work of our Health Department and our Medical Reserve Corps volunteers. We look forward to bring that same high level of service to these pop-up vaccination clinics," added McLaughlin.

The vaccines will follow the same protocol followed at the county vaccination POD, with vaccine doses administered under the supervision of the county Health Department, with county Medical Reserve Corps volunteers assisting in the process.

"We understand there are still some residents hesitant about getting vaccinated. These clinics will be easy, accessible and feature a one-shot vaccine. We encourage those who have not been vaccinated to take advantage of these convenient opportunities throughout this summer," said Wachunas.

"We continue to encourage those who want to get vaccinated to take advantage of these convenient opportunities that have been provided by Rensselaer County and our partners," said Chairman Michael Stammel of Rensselaer.

"I'm thrilled that our vaccination rates in our County are climbing and I'm hopeful that this push will help us all moving forward. These convenient opportunities for residents to get vaccinated while attending ball games and concerts will make getting vaccinated that much easier," said Chair of the Legislature's Health Committee Scott Bendett of Averill Park.

4-H Clover Chefs Virtual Workshops

Many youth are interested in learning about preparing foods and are attracted to the hands-on aspect of cooking. Cornell Cooperative Extension of Rensselaer County 4-H Junior Chefs program continues to offer valuable life skills to youth through programs such as this. The 4-H Junior Chefs program offers cooking workshops for youth eight years and older as well as Cloverbud workshops for our 5-7 year old members. These cooking opportunities transitioned to a virtual format due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Participants receive recipes and information about what they will be cooking a week prior to the class and on the evening of the workshop they cook along with 4-H Program Coordinator, Eileen DePaula, via Zoom from their home kitchens.

During each workshop, youth are provided with instruction in kitchen safety, sanitation, nutrition, food safety, and introduced to a variety of food items. Each session has a different theme, such as international foods, baking, and New York State Produced Products (using ingredients found locally).
