East Nassau Board **Of Trustees** "Close The Books" **On 2020**

The East Nassau Board of Trustees met on May 26 to review their budget and "close the books' on 2020, so they could officially start 2021's year, which began on June 1. According to Mayor Adam Acquario, "the state of the Village is good." While the Mayor noted that 2020 was a year where many projects were delayed, many headings in the budget, including maintenance of streets, snow removal, and public works, did not exceed their limit and had substantial savings. This year the Village hopes to utilize that money to work on some of the roads in need of repair like Webster Hill and Murdoch Road.

The Village also decided to approve some of the allocated money to assist the Village by purchasing a laptop and camera to have virtual meetings. Presently the Mayor is using his personal computer, and members of the Board believed it was more effective, security-wise, for the Village to attain the asset of a village computer that officials will be able to use for years to come.

The Board examined the Building line in the budget and realized they were in arrears on paying the rent for using the Hoags Corners Ambulance Building for 2020. The Mayor sincerely apologized to the ambulance squad and asked for approval to pay the bill and pay the rent for 2021 early in

its entirety. The Board granted his request.

The meeting con-uded with Mayor cluded Acquario providing the good news from the Public Service Commission that the Spectrum Franchise Agreement was approved and is presently being put in
