Central County News Troy Veteran's CBOC Closing Draws Assemblyman's Ire R

Last week *The Eastwick Press* asked if the Troy the Troy CBOC facility Community-Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) for veterans is actually closing its doors following a press release from the Veterans Administration.

It stated the CBOC was being realigned, and that expanded facilities in either Albany, Schenedtady or Clifton Park would be available. We sent an email to the VA asking for specifics. In response, they answered "to say that the facility on River Street is being closed would be an inaccurate classification, Clinics are relocated based on lease contracts." They went on to say, "this has nothing to do with a location but everything to do with our commitment to ensuring our veterans' healthcare needs are met and, as such, remains our top priority, regardless of location. All of the elements that could raise concerns due to distance did not change the options available, which remain in place and continue to be afforded to Veterans." Bottom line is, the doors in Troy will no longer be open.

We also asked about about the increased travel distance for veterans especially in the rural portions of Rensselaer County. The VA said they have "carefully reviewed and coordinated the various transportation options available to veterans through VA, the county VSOs and DVAs to ensure the realignment doesn't impact our rural area veterans who are aware and accustomed to receiving these transportation services as they often do when referred to the Albany VA Medical Center for advanced or complex health care treatments or services. This is not unfamiliar to them. None of these options will be affected and they will continue to provide veterans with the transportation they need, as has always been the case." The VA's spokesman also said the CBOC in Bennington and Veterans' Clinic is Pittsfield are options for those living closer to these facilities.

Ashby Reacts

None of this is sitting well with 107th District Assemblyman Jake Ashby, who told *The Eastwick Press* he is demanding immediate action and a swift reversal of the recent announcement by the Veterans Administration to close the Troy Community Based Outpatient Clinic. Despite serving over 1,000 Veterans a year, the VA has elected to close the facility, apparently, in order to save money related to the cost of leasing the building.

"The decision to close the Troy CBOC facility represents a tremendous error in judgment and a slap in the face to the thousands of Veterans who rely on the VA for their medical coverage," said Assemblyman Jake Ashby, a combat Veteran and the current Ranking Member of the Assembly Veterans Affairs Committee. "I know many fellow Rensselaer County

Veterans who utilize this facility for their care who will now be directed to facilities far outside of our County."

Ashby also noted the peculiar choice to announce this closure on the cusp of Memorial Day Weekend. "Announcing the closure of this facility at any point of the year would have been difficult for our local Veterans, but to do it as we begin Memorial Day Weekend comes off as disrespectful to the women and men who answered the call in service to our country."

The Veterans Health Administration created the Community -Based Outpatient Clinic program in the early 1990s in order to expand capacity and provide efficient primary care, particularly focusing on Veterans who had to travel out of their area to receive their health services.
