

Columbia Turnpike Crash Claims A Life

Schodack Police Department Press Release

Early Wednesday morning the Schodack Police responded to a motor vehicle accident on Columbia Turnpike just west of NYS Rt. 150. Upon arrival patrols located 3 damaged vehicles in the roadway along with accident debris and sections of guard rail. The preliminary investigation revealed an initial one car vehicle crash that took the life of Craig Gendron, 47 of Schodack. Following the initial crash two additional vehicles were damaged as a result of striking debris in the roadway. The operators of these vehicles were both treated and released at the scene by the Bruen Ambulance Service. Patrols were assisted on scene by the East Schodack and Schodack Valley Fire Departments. Town Bookkeeper Large Police Presence Resigns

Cites Hostile Working Environment

At the Monday, June 28 Town Board meeting, Town Supervisor Ingrid Gundrum read a letter from Maureen Seel, the town's bookkeeper, in which she stated that Councilman Frank Lewandusky said in a previous workshop meeting and again in a public forum, "the books are a mess." In her letter, she defends her work, and cites many audits by the New York State Comptrollers Office that found only minimal deficiencies. She also claims that Mr. Lewandusky never asked her to attend any of these meetings or contacted her to discuss his concerns. She further states that the councilman has made "continuous derogatory remarks in reference to my job performance." She said she considers this to be a defamation of character, and has created for her a hostile work environment. She also states she is considering legal action and resigned effective immediately.

Ms. Gundrum, speaking during legislative privilege (a session for Board members to speak on any topic they wish), said she received the letter on June 24, and accepted the resignation with regret. She said Councilman Lewandusky, with what she claims is little municipal bookkeeping knowledge, has stated Grafton's finances are not up to par. This, she says, "could not be further from the truth," and believes a recently approved independent audit of the town finances will bear that out. She also said "I think it's fair to say he wants to be town supervisor, and that's fine." She added this is not the time nor the place for this to play out, while working to serve the people of Grafton.

As to that statement by the Supervisor, Councilman Lewandusky tells *The Eastwick Press* "I have no interest in being Supervisor." Mr. Lewandusky says he stands by his contention that the books are a mess, but stated emphatically "my comments were not directed at Maureen Seel, but at the documents themselves." He also said he is looking forward to the pending audit to determine the accuracy of the town financial records, correct what deficiencies are brought to light and make sure everything is out in the open.

Supervisor Gumdrum says she has not yet named a replacement for Ms. Seel, but wants to assure town residents "there will be a seamless transition." The

bookkeeper is a Supervisor's appointment and does not need Town Board approval.

After taking the year off due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the original Grafton Summer Festival is back and hopes to be bigger and better than ever before.

The Festival is again scheduled to be held in the historic Grafton Town Park on Saturday, July 17. The park is located on NYS Route 2, one mile east of the State Park entrance.

For more than 30 years, the Grafton Summer Festival has been a tradition enjoyed by all the residents of Grafton, the surrounding towns and visitors to the area.

This year we are again featuring Civil War reenactors known as the Crenshaw Battery. There will be soldiers in authentic uniforms including weapons and equipment. At past festivals this has been a very popular exhibit. The people of Grafton have many ancestors who served in the Union Army during the Civil War and we're very proud of that heritage.

Sister Kennan McGowan's Memorial Giant Raffle will have close to 100 prizes with a growing monetary grand prize. Tickets are available from most parishioners of Our Lady of the Snow Mission and Our Lady of Victory Church. Tickets will also be sold all day on Saturday, July 17.

There will be a chicken BBQ served from noon until 2 pm, or when the meals are sold out. The dinners consist of ½ chicken, baked potato, coleslaw and dessert and can be enjoyed on site or for take-out. SCHODACK

No Decision Yet On Cannabis

The sale of marijuana in the Town of Schodak was one of the items on the list of things to be discussed at the Thursday, June 24 Town Board meeting. Attorney Christopher Langlois explained to the Board that under the new Cannabis law, the town must act by year's end if they want to opt out, and not allow any (Supervisor Dave Harris laughingly referred to them as "head shops") retail sales outlets within its boundaries. Opting out carries with it a loss of tax revenue that might generated in Rensselaer County, and Mr. Langlois promised to have a full breakdown of the ramifications for their next meeting. If the town does nothing, marijuana retail shops would have the right to open doors provided all state, county and local code restrictions are met.

Re-apply For CDBG monies

Supervisor Harris informed the Board their application for a 2020 Community Development Block Grant to pay for water and waste water improvements along the NYS Route 9 corridor has been denied. He said they were in the final 20, but did not make the cut for the 10 that were granted. The town has hired the Laberge Group (engineering consultants) to assist them in applying for a 2021 grant. As part of the procedure, Schodack would have to approve a bond resolution as a sort of back up, with the hopes if the grant is approved this time around, they would never have to use it.

Dog Impound Fee

Supervisor Harris and board members discussed a proposal to charge a impound fee of \$35 for dogs picked and housed by the Dog Control Officer. According to Mr. Harris, the intent is to entice dog owners to keep a closer watch on their pets, as many are "repeat offenders." Councilman Jim Bult however, felt it would not be fair to charge everyone, noting even the most conscientious dog owners have on occasion dealt with a runaway. He felt the impound fee should be waived for the first offense, and if the animal is picked up again, then it can be imposed. The other Board members were of like heart, and approved the fee with the first time exemption.

New Phone System

The Board also heard a proposal for a new phone system that would be cloud based and eliminate any boxes on site at the Town Hall, Highway Garage and Police Department. Board member Scott Swartz wasn't completely sold on the idea or the proposed savings, stating "we need to walk carefully on this." The Board

is requesting more information.

DMV Is Back

The Department of Motor Vehicles Satellite Office in the Schodack Town Hall will re-open on its regular schedule starting Tuesday, July 13. Meanwhile, the Board has decided to let a contract with DMV for the use of a road testing site expire, and re-negotiate with some conditions.

Other Business

The Board appointed Alan Roehr Jr. as a part-time police officer and withdrew a resolution to prohibit the assessment of any fees or penalties and/or the relevying of any delinquent water or sewer charges as per the requirements in a 2021 state law. Supervisor Harris said there are some major changes to the law being considered, and urged no action at this time.

SVMC Seeks Input On Colorectal Cancer Screening

Southwestern Vermont Medical can prevent cancer from developing. Center (SVMC) is initiating a survey to collect information about Colorectal Cancer (CRC) Screening. The goal of the survey is to understand barriers to screening so SVMC can address those barriers to increase patients' CRC screening rates and lower mortality due to colorectal cancer.

Colorectal cancer (cancer that begins in the colon) is the third most common cancer in the United States for both men and women. There are often no symptoms until the disease progresses, but it is highly treatable in its early stages. Regular screenings can identify abnormalities early on and help prevent them from turning into cancer. In most cases, colorectal cancers begin as benign or non-cancerous polyps (small growths that project out from the inside lining of the colon or rectum). Not all polyps turn into cancer, but those that do typically take several years. Screening for colon cancer is crucial because it allows polyps or abnormal tissue to be detected and removed early, which

If colorectal cancer is found in early stages, it is extremely treatable.

"SVMC primary care providers are experts in screening for disease, including colorectal cancer," said Robert Schwartz, MD, medical director for Primary Care, Dartmouth-Hitchcock Putnam. "They are able to ensure that patients get the screening that is right for them. They will also ensure that the patient gets appropriate follow up and all questions are answered."

Community opinions about colorectal cancer screening will be collected using a short, anonymous digital survey. A link to the electronic survey will be published at svhealthcare. org, included in SVMC's weekly e-newsletter and posted on the hospital's social media pages. Those who complete the survey can opt to submit their email address be included in a drawing to receive one of ten \$50 gift cards. The survey will close on August

Comptroller Audits Network User Accounts

The audit, performed on NLCS and many other schools around the state, was to see if there were adequate internal controls over network user accounts to prevent unauthorized use, access and loss.

The comptrollers found there were some deficiencies in these controls, listing the following:

- The district did not disable 26 unneeded generic accounts.
- Did not ensure acceptable use policy compliance.
- Did not monitor the use of information technology resources.
- Did not provide IT security awareness training to all employees using IT

They also found however, that sensitive IT control weaknesses were communicated confidentially to officials.

The Comptroller recommends the District

- Develop and implement written procedures for granting, changing and disabling user permissions and monitoring compliance with the acceptable use policy.
- · Maintain an authorized network user list and routinely evaluate and disable unneeded accounts.



Ditching Those Dead Batteries Submitted by Steve Powers, New Lebanon CSC Chair

As part of its efforts to support the town's environmental resilience and awareness, the New Lebanon Climate Smart Communities Task Force has figured out a way to help residents deal with the dilemma of dead batter-

Generally the public is told that regular alkaline, manganese and carbon-zinc batteries are not considered hazardous waste and can be disposed of with ordinary trash. Yet these batteries do contain zinc and manganese dioxide, which is a cumulative neurotoxin that can be toxic in higher concentrations. They are "non-hazardous" only compared to other battery types.

To make battery disposal simple environmentally responsible, members of the Task Force distributed The Big Green Boxes at the West Lebanon and New Lebanon Post Offices, the Town Hall and the Country Squire Supply store.

The boxes are there to collect resident's household batteries such as alkaline batteries from remote controls, rechargeable laptop or cell phone batteries or old power tool batteries. Even old cell phones can be dropped off for recycling. Car batteries, of course, should be returned to an automotive supply store.

When the boxes are full, the Task Force will be responsible for sending them for environmentally safe, certified recycling

More Big Green Boxes will appear in New Lebanon schools in the fall.




Dorothy M. Baker

Relatives and friends may call at the church on Saturday from 11 am until the



George Tries To Collect Charlotte's Judgement

Wednesday, October 23, 1850: Today Geo P. took his horse and carriage and rode to Pittsfield to see Squ. J. A. Gold, Esq. concerning the proposals or the offer that Mr. Ross makes to satisfy the judgement my daughter holds against him but the proposals we did accept and Geo P. fetched Cornelia Wylie home with him. Today I pulled and cut turnips. This forenoon John F. took the horse and carriage and fetched Laura Worden to the widow Eliza Wylie's to sew and prepare for the funeral of H. P. Wylie.

Thursday: I and my family went to the funeral of H. P. Wylie at his house, Elder Nathan Sweet preached. Brother F. Jay Wylie from Pittsfield tended the funeral and took dinner with us, and returned home tonight and carried his daughter Cornelia. I sent a line and proposals by him to J. A. Gold, Esq., that \tilde{I} would settle with Mr. Ross for nine hundred and fifty dollars and said Ross pay all cost.

Friday: This forenoon I pulled and cut turnips and this afternoon I took the one horse wagon and carried 14½ bushels turnips to Geo W. Glass factory hands and he agreed to pay me in flannel, a yard flannel for a bushel of turnips. He now owes me 20½ yards, Quite rainy this afternoon.

Saturday: I continue to wear the truss I bought in Troy and do but little work. Today I patched and pieced the stoop

Sunday: I took my one horse wagon and carried my wife to Elder Sweet's meeting and then I went to Elder Havens' meeting. I then met my wife to cousin John Wylie's and we stayed there tonight for it was rainy.

Monday: This morning after breakfast I and my wife returned home from John Wylie's. Today I and my two sons gathered apples and pulled and cut turnips. Tonight Mr. Minor from Windsor stayed with us with a span of horses, he came to buy apple trees of Geo P.

Tuesday: This morning Geo P. went to his nursery with Mr. Minor and got up part of the trees and then John F. went and took Geo P. place getting said trees up, 61 in number and Minor paid eleven dollars. Geo P. went on to White Creek, Washington County and stayed to Cornelias Van Vecton to buy his flock of sheep, but the sheep were sold and Charles Palmer went with Geo P. to help drive the sheep if Geo P. had bought them. Towards night John F. went to Hancock with one horse wagon and carried Agustus Landon two bushels toward the five bushels that he bargained for to paint my one horse wagon and four bushels to Tracy's store on account and one bushel to a shoe maker that tapped his boots.
