Fatal Pedestrian-Auto Crash on Route 2

Rensselaer County Sheriff Press Release

On September 12, at 9:06 pm, the Rensselaer County Sheriff's Office responded to the scene of a pedestrian-automobile accident on NY-2 and Blue Factory Road in the Town of Brunswick.

Upon arrival to the scene, Deputies spoke with members of the responding Fire Department and determined the male pedestrian was deceased. The vehicle involved was off the roadway a short distance from the scene, with members of the Fire Department working to assist the

driver from the vehicle. No further injuries were reported.

The accident is still under investigation. The names of the victim and driver are not being released at this time. We would like to thank the following responding agencies for their assistance during this tragic event: Eagle Mills Fire Department, Center Brunswick Fire Department, Mohawk Ambulance, North Greenbush Ambulance, and the New York State Police Collision Reconstruction Unit.



Regarding Mr. McLean's complaint about how he could have died waiting for an ambulance –


Folks, Ambulance EMTs are not your personal servants. By definition, once a Town's Ambulance is on a call it is unavailable to anyone else until that first call is complete. Even were a local ambulance available, it would necessarily take longer to reach the caller, and then the hospital, than an immediately available ride

This is because most rural ambulance services, like Petersburgh's, are Volunteer – ie, unpaid. These people have taken hundreds of hours out of their lives to complete training, certifications, and then willingly interrupt whatever they are in the middle of doing, including paid work, to quickly drive to the rescue squad garage, get the vehicle, and drive to the caller's house. The caller would have almost been to the ER by then.

So until Mr. McLean himself wishes to volunteer his service in some of the many ways rural Towns need folks to serve, he might consider whether this is a "broken" ambulance system, or a well-functioning one ... where volunteer EMTs are not his personal servants, instead serving all emergency callers as soon as ambulances and personnel are available.



IDA Tables Solar Request

More Residential Traffic Complaints

There were two meetings of importance to the Town of Brunswick on Thursday, September 8. The first was held by the Rensselaer County Industrial Development Authority (IDA) where a request by CVE North America for sales and mortgage tax exemptions and possible funding was discussed. The Town vehemently opposed the request with a letter from Supervisor Phil Herrington read into the record at a public hearing, held just two days earlier. The Supervisor pointed out the commercial solar project already has agreed to a Payment in Lieu of Taxes stipulation, which affords CVE a significant tax break. Mr. Herrington further stated that except for the construction period, the project does not create any full-time jobs and asked that the request be rejected.

The IDA decided to table CVE's request, with Supervisor Herrington telling *The Eastwick Press* he was informed the reason for the IDA's action was ostensibly for further legal review. Several messages left by *The Eastwick Press* with the IDA have gone unreturned.

Traffic Concerns Right Up Front

Later that Thursday evening, the Town Board's regular meeting began with more complaints as to the volume, speed, and truck traffic driving along Otsego Avenue and other neighboring streets. This is a complaint that began when it was announced Hannaford was building a 50,000 square foot grocery store at the intersection of Lord Avenue and Hoosick Road. That

project has also seen the installation of a new traffic light at that intersection. Hannaford paid for a traffic study of the area that determined their new store would not cause any significant traffic increase, a finding many residents of the neighborhood disagreed with.

What Can Be Done?

Rensselaer County Sheriff Pat Russo tells *The Eastwick Press* he is assigning a traffic detail to the area in question and Supervisor Herrington says he will speak to the Board members about enacting a local law to place weight limits as well.

Hannaford opens its door on Saturday, September 17. Following that opening, another traffic study will be conducted. The Capital District Transportation

Committee is also conducting a study along Hoosick Road, hopefully by year's end.

Moratorium Extended

The Board also approved another six-month extension of the two-family and multi-family housing moratorium. A review of the Town Code's proposed revisions met with several suggestions at a public hearing and the Board requested a little more time to ponder these suggestions. The moratorium was due to expire this week.

Brunswick Elks Lodge Benefit for Christopher's House

It was spaghetti for dinner Monday evening at Brunswick Elks Lodge. Elks Club chef and lecturing knight, Kathy Betzinger, lovingly made 64 spaghetti dinners to benefit Christopher's House, the South Troy women veterans' home run by Christine Rem, with support from Betzinger's sister, Jane Cordts.

The Eastwick Press spoke with ex-exalted ruler and Elks Club member, Dale Loucks, about the spaghetti dinner and their mission to assist Christopher's House with their needs during the evening.

'Kathy Betzinger said there is a homeless women vets center, and they need a shed. She was going to ask for the funds from here (Brunswick Elks Lodge) and I said why don't we try and do something with the National Foundation. So, I called, and they said yeah, we could do this," said Loucks.

With the shed costing \$5,000, Loucks contacted a man in Chicago who told him to use the Gratitude Grant and the Peeking Grant (a total of \$6,500) for the shed and another charity of choice. Loucks gave \$1,500 to Brittonkill Central School District for their Backpack program and the \$5,000 for Christopher's House shed. Loucks placed the application for the grants in May and Christopher's House received the shed mid-summer.

What was the purpose of the dinner?

Well, the fundraiser here is to help defray some of the expenses—the everyday expenses. There are probably a lot of expenses, and so this spaghetti dinner is to help pay for some of the expenses that have concurred," added Loucks. Loucks added that in

the future, Christopher's House wants to add parking for their tenants.

"Your organization gets better when you do things for the community," said Loucks.

With the support of Loucks, Betzinger, Elks Lodge staff, and event supporters, \$861 was raised for Christopher's House.

Woods Brook Buyout Issues Continue

Since what has been described as the 100-year Term Energy to perform an Industrial Grade storm occurred on July 1, 2017, the Woods Brook and in particular where it passes through the Village has been in front of the Hoosick Falls Board of Trustees nearly every meeting since. The Trustees' Tuesday, September 13 meeting was no exception.

The vast majority of the clean-up work is done and the Village voted earlier this year to erect fencing for both safety and aesthetic concerns. Along Hall Street that is complete, but at 107/115 Main Street, not so much. The NYS grant that pays for the Woods Brook clean-up was set to expire soon, but has been extended with a requirement for more information concerning the fencing.

Mayor Rob Allen has recently met with the NYS Department of Conservation, their consultant, Codes Enforcement Officer Mark Surdam, and Highway Superintendent Niel Stowell, where four different scenarios were presented as to what would happen in the Village if another major storm were to occur. As conditions presently stand, a storm of a 10-year magnitude would cause some flooding, more so with a 50-year storm, and once again, significant flooding on another 100-year storm. Some of DEC's proposed fixes would include the removal of a structure at 20 Elm Street and the Dodge Building on Church Street. Mayor Allen used a Power-Point presentation to highlight the study and more discussions are planned.

ARPA Funding

Following presentations from Civicure and the Hoosick Rescue Squad, the Trustees voted to approve \$10,000 each for the organizations from their American Rescue Plan monies. The Village received their second installment of funds in July and continues to discuss where to best allocate it. They have until 2024 to spend the money following federal guidelines.

LED Lighting

The Trustees voted to authorize Mayor Allen to sign a Professional Services agreement with Real-

Audit of the current street lights and what could be saved by switching to LED lighting. This involves only the lighting elements themselves, not the poles or current fixtures. It is estimated the Village could save over one million dollars over 20 years.

Looking for a New Police Chief

The Trustees have finished their deliberations on the specifications surrounding the Village Police Chief's position. One of the changes made is to transition the post to fulltime. The former Chief Bob Ashe resigned earlier this year after pleading guilty to a misconduct charge.

The help wanted sign is also out for two to three part-time Officers, a full-time Laborer, a Motor Equipment Operator Light for the DPW, as well as Planning and Zoning Board of Appeals members.

Other News and Notes

The Trustees agreed to provide funding for the NY Forward committee to hire a consultant to finish the grant application. Two to three thousand dollars is the cost. The grant, if approved, would provide monies for downtown restoration projects. The restoration of the Grandma Modes mural is scheduled to start soon. Work on the southern end of the Greenway project is held up until some boundary line issues can be resolved. Repairs for the 59 Church Street roof have gone to bid but none have been received so far. Three new local laws are in the works involving Outdoor Dining, the discharging of firearms within the Village and a Noise Ordinance. The firearms law was sparked by a recent incident involving a rapid fire weapon being used perhaps too close to other structures and the apparent loophole

in current regulations. There was no criminal intent in the firing of the weapon.

Upping the Ante for a Codes Enforcement Officer

The Town of Hoosick's Codes Enforcement Officer around the Town and the Village. (CEO), Lloyd Moses, has resigned, effective September 1, although he is working one day a week to help the Town out. At the Town Board meeting on Monday, September 12, Town Supervisor Mark Surdam indicated he recently received two applications but is not sure either applicant has State certification.

The CEO position is currently part-time, but after some discussion, the Board members voted to change it to a full-time appointment. They cited the everincreasing workload and their belief it might help with employee retention. The post currently pays \$25,000, with the Board suggesting a full-time salary of \$30-\$40,000, depending on the appointee's current level of qualification. To make the CEO full-time, the Board would have to change the job description and make a budget modification.

Ever Want to Drive a Zamboni?

There is another job looking to be filled: that of a Winter Ice Skating Rink Manager. This position involves working nights and evenings (sometimes until 3 am) maintaining the rink and ice surface. Contact the Town Office if interested. Councilman Bill Hanselman said the rink is still plagued with a leaking roof and occasional flooding after heavy rains. The Board agreed it is something they need to work on to be ready for the coming winter season.

Routine Business

The rest of the meeting went quickly and smoothly, with most of the business dealing with updates. Town Historian Rick Ferrannini talked about plans to install a number of interpretive signs at various places

The Summer Recreation Program went very smoothly and was well attended. Same was said about the Swim Program. The cover has been placed on the pool but is in need of some repair. The Highway Department has gone back to five-day, eighthour shifts. Assessor Tony Rice says the revaluation update is moving along. The Town has sent in a letter of support to the Rensselaer County IDA for i3 Imaging's plans to set up shop at 1 Mechanic Street. The Board members set a workshop on the Zoning Law Re-write for Tuesday, October 18 at 6 pm. There is still no final word on the \$925,000 State and Municipal Facilities grant request. The Board hopes to use some of this money for repairs to the basketball court surface. It was announced at this meeting that the lighting upgrade has been completed. The Capital District Transportation Committee has sent out bid requests for the Road Asset Management Scope of Work Draft, returnable by October 5.

Work is progressing on signage to help combat illegal dumping on Town roads and the Gooding Farm at 22420 State Route 22 has officially been named a State Historic Site.

Wendy Larson appointed to the Hoosick Housing Authority Board and Garry Sussman to the Zoning Board of Appeals.

GOP Election Commissioner Charged With Ballot Fraud

Rensselaer County's Republican Election Commissioner Jason Schofield was arrested by FBI Agents Tuesday morning, September 13, and later arraigned in Federal Court in Albany on charges of ballot fraud. According to the indictment, Schofield is alleged to have taken possession of absentee ballots, brought them to voters to sign, but not actually vote—which allowed him or other individuals to cast ballots in their name. Schofield pled not guilty to the charges

Election and was released pending future court appearances.

The FBI's investigation into the ballot fraud case involving last November's general election saw former Troy City Councilwoman Kim Ashe-McPherson arrested on similar charges in June, which resulted in a guilty plea and her resignation from the Council.

If convicted, Schofield could face a prison term of up to five years, a potential \$250,000 fine, and probation.





Goldenrod Gala Visitor



It is the time for Goldenrod awe as our area fields and roadsides are covered in blooming Goldenrod (Solidago), with its more than 100 species. If you look closely at the flowers, you may find a longhorn beetle called the Locust Borer (Megacyllene robiniae), which may be over an inch long like this one. These beautiful beetles dine on goldenrod pollen, as do many insects. Unfortunately, this beetle's larvae tunnel beneath the bark of black locust trees destroying them. John F. Continues to Be Ill

Saturday, December 11, 1852: Today of John F. Doctor Bates tended to doctoring John F. and he is no better. On this evening Geo P. returned home from Windsor collecting money for fruit trees

Sunday: Today Doctor Bates came to doctor John F. and I paid ten cts to said Bates for a small bottle castor oil he called and bought to the store for us, and John F. continues to be no better. This afternoon cousin Jay Morton took my horse and wagon and carried my two daughters over to the Lecture Room to hear a man from Lebanon springs preach.

Monday: John F. is not so well and towards night I took my horse and wagon and went after Doctor Bates and met him on the way going, I went to Pool Hill and Matthew Lord paid me the cash for the fat hog I carried him last week, which was 21 dollars and 70 cents at 7 dollars per hundred. I called to N. Nichols post office and left a letter for J. M. Glass. I made inquiry for the oil or essence of hemlock to said Nichols and other places but could not get any. Today the widow Amy Moffitt came and stayed part of the day and helped take care

Tuesday: This forenoon Doctor Bates came to John F., and he is not in quite so much pain. Today I and Geo P. went with John F. ox team and sled over to my Rodgers farm and got a load corn stalks and while there we went down into my swamp pasture and got a broken leg sheep and Geo P. skinned said sheep. Today Jane Wylie tailored to our house to make Geo P. a pair pantaloons.

Saturday: I and Geo P. repaired the stable floor and mangers and tended to chores. Jane Wylie tailored two days for me and three days for Geo P., she made me a pair pantaloons and a vest and Geo P. two pair pantaloons and a vest and we paid her one dollar and fifty six cents. Today Doctor Bates came to John F. and says he is a little better. Today Appolas Rollo called and took up two notes of 400 dollars that Geo P. held against him.

Sunday: I went to the funeral of James Gardner to the Presbyterian meeting house and Mr. Bronson preached. I rode over with a young Cracker(?) that was passing and walked home. Doctor Bates came to John F. He is the same.
