Special thanks to the team at the Grafton senior









BRUNSWICK **Ambulance and Traffic Concerns Addressed**

fic and ambulance coverage questions dominated the discussion at the Brunswick Town Council meeting on Thursday, November 10. First, the traffic. Supervisor Phil Herrington mentioned the Capital District Transportation Committee (CDTC) has picked the engineering firm of Creighton Manning to complete the traffic study along Hoosick Road. According to the Supervisor, the Albany based firm was chosen at the urging of the NYS Department of Transportation, because they have traffic light specialists on staff. The traffic lights along Hoosick Road are often mentioned as a contributing factor to the long back-ups. The CDTC's study will probably not take place until the Aldi store is open, in order to get a complete picture of the traffic scenario. Aldi, meanwhile, has had some issues establishing threephase power to the store with National Grid, thus backing up an as yet unannounced opening date. The CDTC would also like the Town to form an advisory committee of area residents, a Town official, and a business representative to be part of the traffic study. The Board appointed Christine Fronhofer as the first member of that committee. Hannaford also established an

Hoosick Road (NYS Route 7) traf- escrow account for a second traffic study once their store on Lord Avenue opened. That opening took place in September and some of that money is now to be used for traffic counts in the affected areas.

> On a positive note, the Sycaway community expressed their thanks to the Town for closing several roads in the area so their neighborhood Halloween Parade could be safely held.

The Ambulance Is Coming, **But When?**

While ongoing issues and resolutions to the ambulance response time issue remain under review, Supervisor Herrington stated he has had several meetings with Mohawk Ambulance, who claim they are having some success with their staffing issues, and are now keeping an ambulance in Brunswick whenever possible, and if that ambulance is called out, back filling by placing another ambulance on standby in the Troy Plaza. Mohawk claims they now have a 98% response rate in the Town. Herrington says the Town is working with Mohawk on some mutual aid agreements as well. News and Notes



As long-time residents, we are appealing to everyone else who is fortunate enough to call this area home to consider contributing to the campaign. No gift is too small. Every donation matters.



HOOSICK FALLS Rogers Avenue Water Tank Concerns Linger

To buy or not to buy? That is the question that faced the Hoosick Falls Board of Trustees at their Wednesday, November 9 meeting. The question involved a small strip of land adjacent to the Rogers Avenue site, which the Village might use in any replacement of the leaky tank. Hoosick Falls has twice been turned down in their efforts to obtain a New York State grant to pay for the work. The Board has received an appraisal on the parcel but by law would have to offer a fair market value for the land.

It was also said that if the Rogers Avenue site had to go offline for repairs or possible replacement, the other pump stations that are part of the water district could handle the load for a while.

The Water and Sewer Department also has another problem that deals with grease being poured down drains. Do not do it was their strong advice, as a recent sewer clog was found to have been caused by a long gooey string of grease in the pipeline.

Local Laws

Two public hearings were held on a pair of local law proposals. One restricts (basically prohibits) the discharge of firearms and crossbows with in the Village limits, with exceptions for law enforcement. That was approved. A second law authorizing the issuance of temporary permits for outside dining and sidewalk sales displays was tabled. Some Trustees wanted to see the inclusion of sanitary conditions, dealing with waste receptacles, and prohibiting the use of municipal garbage containers. If so amended, the law would have to be re-introduced and another public hearing held.

The Village Police Department has a computer that is old, failing and obsolete. The Trustees agreed to the purchase of a replacement. They also said yes to a five-year agreement for the purchase of new tasers.

Officers would be required to complete training on the new equipment before it could be put into use. Approved as well was the purchase of two department cell phones so officers would not have to use their private phones on duty. The phones would have to be signed in and out for each shift, and no private use would be allowed.

They Will Be Sorely Missed

Mayor Rob Allen announced that Highway Department Superintendent Niel Stowell will be retiring in January after 30 years of service. Also leaving is Village Attorney Andy Gilchrist, though he will stay on until his replacement can be found. Mayor Allen lamented the departures and thanked both for their dedication and service to the Village.

Election Time

The dust has not yet settled from the 2022 mid-term elections and the Village is talking about their next round of balloting. It is slated for March 21, with petitions available in January for filing between February 7 and 14. Two seats on the Board with two-year terms are open. A one-year seat held by Megan Walraed, and Mayor Allen's two-year term will also be on the ballot.

News and Notes

The purchase of a bike repair station, bike rack, and kiosk for the Hoosic River Greenway Trail at the Northern Trailhead was approved using money from the Greenway grant. The Trustees adopted a 504 Grievance Procedure to close out the Woods Brook update grant undertaken in conjunction with the Town of Hoosick. Roof repair at 114 Church Street was discussed. Building and Codes will contact Rensselaer County about the repairs as it is a County owned building. Trustees will contact the Federal Rail Authority (FRA)

about trains blowing their whistle at every crossing in the middle of the night. Finally, the Village still needs one person to fill out the Planning and Zoning Boards of Appeal.

East Nassau Board of Trustees Highlights

After the East Nassau Board of Trustees held their workshop meeting on November 9 to amend the Code Administration and Enforcement Law (Local Law #1 of 2022), the Board held their regular meeting where they discussed everything from public hearings and cookies to speed humps.

First, the Board approved a public hearing for the revised Local Law #1 for December 14 at 6:45 pm at the Hoags Volunteer Ambulance building. The Board had last revised the law in 2006. The State is now requiring that a new law be passed before the end of the year and will provide for the administration and enforcement of New York State's Property Maintenance code and the Village's Energy Construction Code.

The Highway Department was approved to purchase speed humps, signs, and accessories for approximately \$5,000 from the Village's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for Hayes Road, which has been having safety issues with speeders. The goal is to have the humps installed for spring.

Speed humps are modular and span 12 to 14 feet wide, or the entire width of a road if desired. Vehicles can pass over them with less of a jolt and can safely maintain speeds of 15-20 miles per hour" (reliancefoundary.com). Highway Superintendent Mike Dorr reported to the Board that a new dead end sign had been ordered for Bath Township Road and Mayor Acquario thanked Dorr for installing the new Village sign. The Code Enforcement Officer also wanted to remind resi-

dents to take advantage of the forms for complaints on the website, and that residents can submit them anonymously.

The Climate Smart Committee was happy to report that the Village has received a designation from The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) as a Clean Energy Community, because of the four high-impact actions that the Village was able to complete. Because of this designation, a \$5,000 grant will be available to the Village through an application process. The Committee's potential ideas for the grant might be an EV charging station, LED lightbulbs, and tree planting.

The Committee also plans on subsidizing another plant sale through the Soil and Water Conservation of Rensselaer County in early 2023.

Board members discussed potential ideas for further use of ARPA funds.

Ensuring Health Equity for Veterans

In honor of Veterans Day, the New York State Department of Health is reinforcing its commitment to ensuring its programs are aimed at eliminating health disparities that result in adverse health outcomes for all New Yorkers, with a focus on the health of the State's military personnel before, during, and after their service.

An annual survey, the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), conducted by the Department, found an estimated 969,000 adults, or 6 percent of the adult population, are veterans, and that 13.5 percent of adults in New York aged 65 and older report past military service.

The report found disabilities are common among veterans, with 37 percent of reporting at least one disability, compared to 26 percent of non-veterans. Of all adults who report serious difficulty hearing, 18 percent, or more than 1 in 6, are veterans.

Veterans aged 18 to 64 are more likely to report they engage in behaviors that put their health at risk, including smoking, and are more likely to report diagnoses of other health conditions than non-veterans in the same age group.

Veterans aged 65 and older are more likely to report a diagnosis of cancer or CVD compared to non-veterans in the same age group.

Shop Local

December is shop local month in Rensselaer County. We encourage everyone to shop local and keep the sales tax revenue in Rensselaer County. Local vendors are the backbone of our community and depend on our support to remain in business. Plus, it may prevent any unnecessary tax increases for the residents of Rensselaer County-a win-win for all. So, please continue to support our local vendors.

Van Rensselaer Manor

Several annual contracts were extended for 2023. Additionally, a resolution was unanimously approved and is authorizing the Manor to hire seven per diem registered nurses in order to alleviate staff shortages. These positions seem easier to fill and offer potential nurses more flexibility with their schedules.

Employment and Training

A renewal agreement to provide employment and training services to eligible low income youth, through the ARC of Rensselaer County and the Commission on Economic Opportunity (CEO), was approved by the Legislature. This 100% federally funded program offers academic and occupational skill training, leadership development, and community service learning, as well as summer employment for disadvantaged, disconnected youth, and those with intellectual disabilities.

HEAP Enrollment Has Begun

With colder weather approaching, New York State Electric & Gas (NYSEG) is reminding customers that enrollment for New York's Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) has begun.

NYSEG is urging customers to take steps to manage their energy bills this winter due to market conditions that have elevated energy supply prices. NYSEG does not own generation, but procures energy on the open market, which has experienced a rise in fuel prices due to supply constraints and global events. The company does not realize any financial benefit from supply charges, as supply charges are passthrough costs that represent the actual cost of purchasing the energy to deliver to customers.

Customers who anticipate the need for heating assistance should take action now to determine their eligibility for HEAP and get enrolled before the cold weather sets in. Those eligible may receive one regular HEAP benefit per program year, and could also be eligible for emergency benefits if they are in danger of running out of fuel.

Diabetes is the seventh leading cause of death in both the United States and New York, impacting 1.6 million New Yorkers, or 10.3 percent of the State's population. The disease has contributed to reductions in quality of life and resulted in significant costs to government, employers, and residents. Without sweeping changes, the number of diagnosed diabetes cases nationwide is expected to increase significantly.

Prediabetes, a condition in which a person's blood sugar level is higher than normal, but not high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes, affects 4.5 million New Yorkers and more than 96 million adults nationwide. Health officials estimate that 90 percent of those with prediabetes are unaware they have it. Without a diagnosis, preventative lifestyle changes, and treatment, roughly 15 to 30 percent of people with prediabetes develop type 2 diabetes within 5 years.

The onset of type 2 diabetes can be delayed or even prevented through early detection and modest lifestyle changes, including regular exercise. To accomplish this, NYSDOH joins the ADA in encouraging health care providers to screen all adults 35 years and older for pre- and type 2 diabetes. Screening should begin earlier for adults with additional risk factors including being overweight, obesity, hypertension, elevated blood cholesterol, or a family history.

NYSDOH has free, multi-language resources available for New Yorkers to assess their risk for prediabetes and prevent or delay disease.

HOOSICK **Motel Concerns Highlight Session**

Recent incidents involving residents of the Falls Motel across from the Hoosick Falls Central School have sparked concerns of area residents. Town Supervisor Mark Surdam indicated one instance involved the school going into lockdown, while the second did not. The new owner of the business spoke at the Monday, November 14 meeting, stating he is in the process of evicting some residents, planning to remodel the building, and is using a property management company to screen further residents to preclude any undesirable occupants. The Board thanked him for the update and asked to be kept in the loop.

Cannabis Update — Earlier this year the Board approved cannabis dispensaries within the Town limits, but placed a moratorium on such business until the State could provide more information on licensing and regulations. That moratorium is due to expire soon and Board members are looking to extend it for another year with a proviso for a second year. It would require the introduction of a local law at the December meeting, a public hearing, and possible adoption in January. Board members indicated that if New York State meets its responsibilities during that time period, the moratorium could be lifted. The Town has opted out of any onsite cannabis consumption at such dispensaries.

Christmas Time in Hoosick — Several Holiday themed events are planned for late November into December. Hoosick Rising will host a Christmas Tree Lighting ceremony in Wood Park on Friday, November 25, at 6 pm. Small Business Saturday follows on November 26 with the Hoosick Armory hosting Maker's Market with over 30 artisans, from 10 am to 4 pm. Downtown retail stores will be open with specials and giveaways. Local retail shops will also be open from 1 to 6 pm on Saturday, December 10, with refreshments and special activities throughout the downtown business district.

Town Budget — The Board gave its approval to the Town's 2023 budget. After some last minute adjustments, the tax hike will be down to 1.73 percent, under the State tax cap.

News and Notes — Assessor Tony Rice reports the revaluation update is on schedule. Supervisor Surdam says they have applications for the Codes Enforcement/Building Inspectors position and he has begun the interviews. He is hopeful of making an appointment at their December meeting. Ayla Senecal was reappointed as the Ice Rink Manager along with several members of the support staff. Deputy Supervisor Eric Sheffer reported he is close to picking some designs for the illegal dumping signage, and hopes that selection will also be on the December agenda. Board members talked about a possible meeting with the Village and the School District in the New Year to compare notes and make sure everyone is on the same page.




Trained staff will be available at the canopy entrance to direct patients to the department they need, and a shuttle to nearby parking.



An Early Cough Syrup

Monday, March 21, 1853: I rode with John F. to Elisha Broad's to the funeral of his grandfather, Amos Broad, the Reverend Mr. Day preached and Geo P. chopped to the door up to his Maxon house and his wife cleaned house and put up her furniture and Charlotte E. and Sarah O. helped her. I lent Philander Hatch 40 dol on interest for one year.

Wednesday: I went to Edwin Adams mill with a grist of corn, and I called down to John Merrils to see if he wanted to hire a house but he was not to home. I left word with his wife to have him come over to my house. Geo P. fetched his wheel to his one horse wagon from Dwight Jones shop that was repaired and he fetched his wife from Aaron Sackett's she had been there on a visit. Thursday: I tended to scalding over brine and pack over beef. I and Patrick tended to Geo P. chores on his Maxon farm, today Geo P. and his wife went to her Father's in Lenox and stayed tonight. Charlotte E. rode with them to Pittsfield and stayed to Brother F. Jay Wylie's. Today John F. started and walked, he went to Vermont to buy cattle and Patrick worked at the wood pile, and this afternoon aaron Merril's wife came and let us know that our cattle had got away from the Rodgers barn and on the way home and I and Patrick met the cattle in Joshua B. Maxon's lot and took them back and put up the fences.

Saturday: This afternoon Geo P. and wife and Charlotte E. returned from Lenox and Pittsfield. While they were in Pittsfield at their uncle F. Jay Wylie's, Geo P. took the cars and went to East Chatham and back to Pittsfield, he went to one Mr. KIng's in Canaan and engaged the remainder of King's nursery of fruit trees that was fit for market and while to King's he paid one dollar for one bottle schenck's Oykminic Syrup that I paid him for, my wife to take.

Sunday: My wife quite unwell with a cough.

Monday: I am quite lame today, Patrick tended to the chores to home, today Geo P. tended to putting up his goods or furniture for keeping house and his wife and Sarah papered his parlor. My wife is no better, the cough.
