DEC Acquires 1,300 Acres in Taconic Mountains

Area Will Link Taconic Ridge and Berlin State Forests

The New York State Department of Environmental protection, wildlife habitat, and recreation. Conservation (DEC) has announced the protection of 1,300 acres of forest and grasslands in the Taconic Mountains in the Town of Berlin. The acquisition will be added to the Taconic Ridge State Forest and provides a critical connection between the Taconic Ridge and Berlin state forests, linking together more than 12,000 acres. New York State purchased the parcel for \$890,000 through the State's Environmental Protection Fund (EPF). The purchase protects forested steep slopes leading to the top of the Taconic Ridge. It includes a tributary of the Little Hoosic River, one of New York State's wild trout streams, and 80 acres of critical grassland habitat. As part of DEC's state forests, this parcel will be managed for multiple uses, including sustainable timber production, watershed

Located in Rensselaer County along the New York and Massachusetts border, the Taconic Ridge and Berlin state forests are primary gateways in the Taconic Mountains that conserve important natural resources and provide diverse outdoor recreational opportunities.

The December 19 meeting of the Petersburgh Town Board began with the information about the upcoming Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) update presentation, which will be on Wednesday, January 18, at 6:30 pm. According to officials, a Department of Health (DOH) representative and a full panel will provide residents with water and air quality updates. The Town Supervisor mentioned that no minutes would be taken at this meeting, but they will ensure the cameras are set up for a Livestream.

The Water District Rates for 2023 will have no increase, but according to a local law, there will be a

10% penalty rate for individuals who do not pay their bills. Board members stressed that this only affects you if you don't pay your bill.

Animals were another important topic of conversation at this meeting. The Town, at this point, does not have a Dog Control Officer. There has been one applicant for the position, and this will be followed up on in early 2023. Residents were encouraged to contact the Supervisor if *Continued on Page 9*

Town Board Highlights

December 19, got right to work organizing for 2023.

The public hearing involved making the Town lead agency on a land use rezoning issue from a Local Law from 2014. The 17.77 acre property on West Road has to be changed from an EF Extraction and Fill Zone to an RU Rural Use district. While the closure of the mine on this parcel happened many years ago, no rezoning occurred. Now that there is some interest in the property, the Board needed to formally rezone the property so planning and zoning processes could

After a public hearing, the Stephentown Board, on December 31. The new calendars are being printed, and it was reported that the transfer station will be closed in 2023 on July 5 and November 11. The Town believes they have found a solution for a lockable storage area for paint, but are working on how to implement it. While they are not accepting paint right now, officials asked that residents stay tuned because they hope to be able to again.

Three bids for road materials in 2023 were opened and reviewed. The Board approved that purchasing materials are up to the discretion of the Highway Superintendent. One proposal was approved for cleaning the Town Hall in Continued on Page 9



New Medical Building Gains Planners' Approval

Following a sidewalk to nowhere issue and delays over sewer design and easements, Paulsen Development's application to construct a two-story medical building at 112 McChesney Avenue gained conditional approval from the Brunswick Planning Board at their Thursday, December 15 meeting. Those conditions were numerous, however.

Water and Sewer Department Superintendent Bill Bradley has given his approval to the preliminary sewer design, although he must still sign off on the final drawings before any construction can begin. Sewer line easements must also be obtained, however the neighboring property owners have sent the Town letters of consent. A \$3,000 escrow account to pay for inspection of the sewer work must be established.

Following a sidewalk to nowhere issue and delays ver sewer design and easements, Paulsen Developent's application to construct a two-story medical work permits from Rensselaer County and the New York State Department of Transportation are another requirement.

The larger expense for Paulsen Development involved that sidewalk to nowhere. The Board required a \$10,000 non-refundable deposit be in place to construct the sidewalk along McChesney Avenue on their property, should a sidewalk be built from the Walmart entrance to Hoosick Road. The developer previously obtained a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals for the height of the building.

Paulsen Development plans to construct the building in conjunction with New York Ortho that will house offices on one floor and a same-day surgery center on the other.

Parking and Speed Problems Before Trustees

By Hoosick Falls Village Board standards, the only on streets they own, not state or county owned Tuesday, December 13 meeting was not that long, but many issues were discussed. Two of the more important topics involved parking problems and traffic moving a little too fast along Village streets.

Earlier this year the Trustees discussed engaging an outside consultant to perform a parking study. Trustee Kevin O'Malley came up with two quotes he said were in the \$25,000 range. The issue, however, faded from the front burner, primarily because there were concerns about where the money to pay for the study would come from. It was revisited at this meeting, with Deputy Mayor Bob Ryan asking Mr. O'Malley if he still had those quotes. The Trustee responded he believed they had expired but would reach out to the firms involved and be back to the Board next month.

Trustee Deb Alter again broached the subject of reducing the speed limit in the Village from 30 to 25 mph. It was noted by Village Attorney Andy Gilchrist that Governor Hochul recently signed legislation giving cities and villages the power to do so, but

roads. In Hoosick Falls, that would impact NYS Route 22's path through the Village. It was also mentioned that some streets may not require the reduction, Main Street being one of them. If changes were made, it appears all signage would have to be modified because it says Village Speed Limit 30 mph. It is a matter that bears more discussion.

Outside Dinina

A Local Law that would allow for temporary outside dining and sidewalk sales was reintroduced. It was scheduled to be voted on at the November meeting but was pulled back after a conversation about refuse disposal. The additional language has been added to the law, with a public hearing and possible vote scheduled for the January gathering of the Board.

1 Center Street

The large and former manufacturing building is run down and has been in a state of disrepair for many years. Unihog owner Jason VonGuinness is attempt-

ing to purchase the building and is seeking a Restore NY grant to refurbish it. That must go through the Village and to that end, a required public hearing will be held in January.

News and Notes

The Village Police Department is looking to add two more full-time officers and have installed a drug drop off box in the lobby of the Municipal Building. Please contact the department if you wish to make a drop off. The Village Board also asked the department to increase speed patrols along lower Classic, Ball, and Cummings Streets. The Trustees are looking into hiring a courier to take water and sewer samples to an Albany lab for testing versus using Village personnel and vehicles. The DPW is being asked to see if there was ever a stop sign at Railroad and Elm Streets. If not, a local law may have to be drawn up to install one. Trustees are looking into some help for Codes Enforcement Officer Mark Surdam who they indicated will be out of service for a while.

Board of Trustees Highlights

After approval of a lot line adjustment, the December 14 East Nassau Board of Trustees meeting conducted their regular business from highway department business to passing a local law.

The approximately \$18,000 salt and sand bill from the Cedar Creek Tree Service and the \$4,000 speed humps and signage for Hays Road were approved. The Treasurer reviewed the bills with the Board. There was a discussion on the reallocation of funds and how they are incorporated into the following year's budget.

New York State made various amendments to the Uniform Code, which municipalities must implement through code administration and enforcement. After the public hearing for Local Law 1 of 2022, the Board approved the Type II action. This law updates the East Nassau Code Administration and Enforcement Law from 2006.

Historian and Board member Tom Kernan reported that the cookie contest in November was a wonderful introduction to the holidays. After a two-year hiatus and a variety of changes in local businesses, more bakers than ever were willing to display their baking skills. He noted over 60 businesses contributed to the event, thanked local businesses and officials for their assistance, and noted the goodwill and community service this fun event brings.

Highway superintendent Mike Dorr submitted a quote for double chip sealing for Gardner Hill Road and Town Garage Rd. The quote will involve utilizing the state Chips funding but also approximately 30K of the ARPA funds that the Village received. The speed humps for Hays Road were discussed. They are trying to figure out the safest way to get them installed and removed. Dorr informed the Board that he plans to retire as Superintendent effective March 31, 2023. Mayor Adam Acquario thanked Dorr for his service to his community.

Members did go into an executive session with the Village attorney about a property on Dunham Hollow Road. Still, Acquario noted that the Board had made no decision at this point. Acquario mentioned that the Village would mail out the newsletter to residents during December.

The new park was noted in the Climate Smart Committee report. The Committee worked on creating trenches and prepped the area for planting in the spring. The potential names for the park submitted are Old Tavern Park, Calico Park, Levinn's Landing, Tavern Green Park, and Tin Horns Park. The Board will review them, and should choose a name in 2023. The Board appreciated the residents' name ideas

Committee chair and Board member Lydia Davis reported that they hope to have the flood preparedness

guide finished by the end of December.

Finally, Mayor Acquario mentioned that the Bell Park Sign needs some paint and would also like to get some quotes on possibly installing electricity there. He also noted that they would like to get the DEC to do a walk-through near the coal shed on Brainard Station Road because of concerns in that area. Stop signs on Tayer Road have been placed on hold until the Village hears back from the County.

they do have a dog control issue at this time. Dog licenses were another issue because several individuals still needed to renew or communicate with the Town Clerk about the animal's status. The Clerk has been discussing this issue with other towns and found that towns have developed local laws about this infraction. The Town has a local ordinance that the Board will review, and the Clerk will follow that law concerning any issues.

The Board decided on January 2, at 7 pm, as their organizational meeting and scheduled a public hearing on January 16, at 6:30 pm, for the local laws to create tax exemptions for senior citizens and citizens with disabilities. The hope is to move forward with this at the next meeting, allowing officials approximately five weeks to complete any necessary paper-

Finally, the Highway Department was complimented for their excellent care in clearing the roads during the recent storms. The Town Board discussed the County Road Service agreement, and the Supervisor reported that it still needs revising. The County is offering approximately \$4,000, while the year before, the amount was \$5,000 higher. The Supervisor stressed that the County would need to take care of its roads if it can't properly subsidize the Town.

Staying Cautious Around Cold Water

This fall saw its share of unseasonably warm and sunny days, but the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation reminds those who are boating, paddling, or hunting from a boat that as the air has cooled, so have the State's waters.

Boaters, paddlers, hunters, and anglers should take the following precautions when heading out on the water during the fall and winter months:

- Always wear your life jacket In fact, wearing a life jacket is legally required for all people on board a recreational boat that is less than 21 feet in length between November 1 and May 1.
- Dress for the water temperature, not the air temperature Choose clothing made from fabrics like wool that hold in body heat when wet. Avoid cotton. Dress in layers and consider investing in a dry suit, wetsuit, or float coat to keep you warm.
- Use the buddy system and let someone know your plans Whenever possible, avoid going out alone. Let someone you trust know your trip plans, including who is going on the trip, where you are going, when you plan to leave and return, and a description of your vessel(s).
- Know the conditions before you head out In addition to the weather conditions, do your research on water conditions. Check for ice starting to form and be aware that water can freeze if temperatures drop throughout the day.



The Life of George Holcomb

by George Holcomb • Transcribed by Betty McClave • Edited by Alex Brooks

George Turns 62

Wednesday, June 8, 1853: I took my one horse wagon and went to Canaan to Curtis Mill and paid three dollars and 37 cents for nine hundredweight of plaster. I took dinner with said Curtis and returned home.

Thursday: I plastered potatoes and corn. Saturday: I worked on my Rodgers farm, I cultivated and hoed corn and potatoes. Today brother Wm Holcomb came from the west on a visit. He came today from Hoosic, he lives in the town of Collins, Erie County south of Buffalo.

Sunday: I went to the funeral of Elisha Broad at his own house. A Methodist by the name of Smith preached. John F. carried me and brother Wm to funeral with his young horse, and Geo P. carried his wife and Charlotte to funeral.

ried his wife and Charlotte to funeral. Monday I took my one horse lumber wagon and carried sister Hannah Twitchel to Canaan Depot to take the cars for home. I paid six cts for beer while I was at the depot, and from the depot I went four miles south west on the Hudson turnpike to what is called Lovejoy's plaster mill, now called Curtises Mill, and paid three dollars for eight hundred and waited three hours for the plaster to be ground. On the road home I sold two hundred pounds of said plaster to the widow of Elisha Broad for the same as I had paid, that is

75 cts for the two hundred. I am sixty two years old today.

Wednesday: Towards night I was fixing Geo P. horse on the wagon and the fills dropped down and frightened the horse and he jumped and broke one of the fills and I fell over back, the horse came partly on me and bruised me a little, but not bad.

Thursday: I this forenoon and Patrick with me went on to my Rodgers farm and tried to drive my bull home, but could not drive him, returned him back in the pasture. I was quite lame. I plastered the corn north of the barn the second time

Friday: I and Geo P. and Patrick worked making a new rail fence on the line joining Alonzo Rodgers, we worked a little over half a day and a thunder shower broke us off from work, and towards night we set out cabbage plants.

Saturday: Today I went with my horse and wagon and carried brother Wm Holcomb on his way to Hoosic, I carried him to Petersburgh to the Worthington Tavern. I paid eight cents for a rum sling and parted with brother Wm. On the way home one old Mr. Tiphony rode with me a few miles. I called in Berlin to Culvers store and paid six cents for a gimlet and bated my horse.
