Stefanik to Open Flagship District Office in Rensselaer County

The new Rensselaer County offices at 99 Troy Road in East Greenbush will also include the flagship office for Congresswoman Elise Stefanik.

The offices for Congresswoman Stefanik are the first congressional offices to be opened in Rensselaer County in recent memory. Former Congressman Jerry Solomon maintained offices in East Greenbush in the 1980s and former Congressman Michael McNulty operated an office in downtown Troy two decades ago.

Through the 2022 congressional redistricting, Congresswoman Stefanik became representative of most of Rensselaer County. She represents 14 out of the 16 municipalities in the County, with the exception of Troy and Rensselaer, along with half of North Greenbush.

Congresswoman Elise Stefanik stated, "My office is known for delivering

exceptional constituent services and we look forward to serving the people of Rensselaer County in New York's 21st Congressional District."

The lease agreement between Rensselaer County and Congress for the offices for Congresswoman Stefanik will be considered at a future meeting of the County Legislature.

The County moved into 99 Troy Road in mid-December as part of the Reimagine Rensselaer County Facilities. The Reimagine plan moves a number of County offices that were located in the County Office Building to 99 Troy Road. Other County offices located elsewhere in downtown Troy, including the Department of Social Services and Probation Department, will be moved to the current County Office Building in Troy.

Congresswoman Stefanik's offices are expected to be open in early February.

It was more than five years ago the Brunswick Planning Board approved the Aldi store on property next to Planet Fitness on Hoosick Road. The project ran into a snag when the NYS Department of Transportation (DOT) refused to place a traffic light at the intersection of Hoosick Road and Lord Avenue. That signal was a demand by Aldi, who refused to spend a dime on construction without it. So there the project sat with neither side willing to budge. The time frame on the Planning Board's approval ran out, and the project was dead in the water, or so it seemed.

Fast forward to 2020 and developer David Leon came back before the planners with a new proposal for Aldi, a Wendy's restaurant and Kentucky Fried Chicken outlet. An Aroma Joe's Coffee drive through was later added Continued on page 4



GRAFTON **Town Board Highlights**



to the mix. This time around DOT was more amiable to a traffic light with some conditions: they wanted a cross conductivity that allowed access to the light from Hillside Drive and a rear entrance into the plaza. That met with opposition from neighbors at a lengthy public hearing. Again, the project was on hold. Enter Hannaford supermarket with a plan to build a new store across the road. DOT then said a light would be needed even without the rear entrance. The light was erected and Hannaford build their store. Full steam ahead, right? Wrong. First there were ground preparation problems, supply chain issues held up some integral components to the construction, and finally a mix up with National Grid over what kind of electrical service was needed. Most of those rough points have now been smoothed over and Aldi says they have targeted the final week of February to open.

Wendy's Will Open First

The Hamburger Restaurant will possibly open before the end of January, while construction on the Aroma Joe's is still percolating.

Another New Business on the Horizon

It was announced at the Planners' January 5 meeting that Dollar General would like to come to Town. They have picked out land at the corner of NYS Route 7 and Carroll's

Grove Road, and are beginning the application process. Before a site plan can even go before the Planning Board, Dollar General needs what is labeled as a Spot Zoning change. The land in question is not zoned for retail at this time. They would need a recommendation from the Zoning Board of Appeals to the Town Board, who alone has the authority to make such a change.

HOOSICK FALLS Free Tax Filing at HACA

For the 18th year, HACA, 26 John St, will assist taxpayers with free income tax preparation and e-filing through the IRS Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. VITA is a free, IRS sponsored program to help low and middle-income workers have their federal and state personal income taxes prepared and filed electronically at no cost.

Tax preparers will meet clients at their cars in the parking lot to collect their information and documents. Upon completion, clients will be contacted to pick them up and sign the required forms for E-filing.

Appointments can be made by calling 2-1-1 from New York, or 888-367-3211 from any area, beginning Monday, January 17.

Vita provides free income tax return preparation with electronic filing to taxpayers who generally earned \$58,000 or less in 2021, persons with disabilities, and taxpayers who need assistance with preparing their returns. Applicants must bring the required documents for each person named on the tax return, including:

- Photo identification
- W-2, 1099 and other IRS forms as appropriate
- Bank account and routing numbers for direct
- deposit
- Social Security card
- Form 1095-A Health Insurance statement if received
- Childcare documentation name and tax ID # of person or organization providing day care
- Unemployment information
- Prior year tax return

New Village Water Source Update **Board Settles PFOA Legal Representation Lawsuit**

In December of 2021 the New York State Depart- Allen has announced the Village and the law firm Lots of Other Work as Well ment of Environmental Conservation (DEC) issued what is called a Record of Decision that required Saint Gobain and Honeywell to drill two new wells and pipe the clean water to the Village's pumping station. At the Tuesday, January 10 meeting of the Board of Trustees, Environmental Attorney Dave Engel presented the Board with an update as to the progress of the work.

The new wells will be drilled on land south of the Village along NYS Route 22. The initial design called for this clean water to be piped along Route 22, over the bridge going into the Village and then looping back to the pump station. A pipe hanging off the bridge was a concern to many involved and it was decided instead to directly pipe the water under the Hoosic River. While this new water source is clean from any PFAS or PFOA contamination, all parties involved have decided to keep the granular activated carbon (CAG) filter in place out of precaution. One of the current wells that is contaminated will remain intact as an emergency source. The DEC is still working to obtain a consent order with the companies involved and all required easements for the pipeline.

Water of a Different Nature

Two new pumps still need to be installed at the former Village owned landfill site for leachate collection. The current pump failed two years ago and its replacement met the same fate. According to Sewer Department Supervisor Ken Holbrook, the supplier of these pumps has repeatedly shipped the wrong units and they are still waiting for the correct replacements.

Another leachate leak has been detected about 100 yards away from the Pan Am Southern rail tracks. The Trustees had some discussion as to whether recent work on the rail tracks may have caused the leak, but it was determined there was no clear connection. The Trustees approved repair work to what is called the Force Main at a cost of \$3,836. All work is mandated by the DEC which has declared the landfill to be a Superfund site.

A Large Legal Bill

When the PFOA crisis came about, the Trustees hired the law firm of Fitzgerald Morris Baker Firth to represent the Village. Their services were terminated in April of 2017, and the firm sent the Village a bill for \$620,000 for legal services. The Trustees balked at the amount and refused to pay which of course resulted in a lawsuit. Mayor Rob

have reached a settlement for \$450,000. The Board agreed to issue a bond to finance that amount. It was noted by the Trustees, had they continued in defense of the lawsuit and lost, late fees and interest payments could have pushed the final bill to over \$900,000.

New Outside Dining and Shopping Law

The local law that would allow sidewalk dining and shopping was approved after being pulled back last month for an additional clause that require periodic refuse clean up during the day and complete removal of all refuse when the event is finished.

New DPW Superintendent

After more than 35-years of service to Hoosick Falls, Department of Public Works Superintendent Niel Stowell is officially retiring on January 26. The Trustees announced that they have hired Sewer Department Superintendent Ken Holbrook as his replacement. Mr. Holbrook with continue to oversee the Wastewater Treatment Plant until a replacement can be found

The search for a new Village Attorney is nearing a conclusion. Andy Gilchrist has resigned but is staying on until his replacement can be found. Mayor Allen says final interviews will take place shortly and hopes to name Mr. Gilchrist's replacement at a special meeting scheduled for Tuesday, January 24.

Another legal matter dealt with at the meeting was the ratification of a new contract with the Village Police Officers union UPSEU. The agreement is retroactive to June of 2022 and contains what Mayor Allen says is a significant pay raise.

Village Speed Limit

Trustee Deb Alter presented other Board members with documentation from the New York State Department of Transportation (DOT) that outlines how and where a village may change speed limits. It excludes State and County owned roads and would require a traffic study. Trustee Alter would like to see the Village speed limit reduced from 30 to 25 miles per hour. She cites speeding and other safety concerns. It would also require changing Village speed limit signs. Some members of the Board do not think it is necessary and Mayor Allen says he is on the fence about it. The Mayor would like to know what Village residents think, and asks they call the Municipal Building to leave him a message as to their thoughts.

Previous Board meetings saw discussion about the lack of a stop sign at the intersection of Railroad Avenue and Elm Street. Trustees approved a resolution to place such signage on Railroad Avenue on the north and south side of Elm Street.

Following a public hearing at which there were no speakers, the Board approved a resolution supporting the rehabilitation of 1 Center Street. The former manufacturing facility is run down and perhaps in a dangerous state. The rehabilitation would be funded by a Restore NY Communities Initiative Grant.

It's budget time and bills are coming due. Mayor Allen told the other Board members it is going to be a struggle this year and they have to look at a lot of cost cutting. One area of concern that needs to be addressed is the Water Department budget. It was agreed that production costs are outpacing water rate collections and that needs some serious scrutiny.

The Board approved the use of Village streets and Wood Park for the 32nd St. Patrick's Day Parade on March 11. The Village's annual donation of \$1,000 to the parade committee also received the Trustees' blessing.

Village elections are scheduled for Tuesday, March 21. Voting will take place from noon to 9 pm, at the Municipal Building on Main Street. The Mayor's office as well as three Trustee positions are on the ballot.

Annual Tree and Shrub Seedling Sale

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has announced the start of the Colonel William F. Fox Memorial Saratoga Tree Nursery annual spring seedling sale, which is open to the public and runs until May 12. Each year, the nursery offers low-cost, New York-grown tree and shrub species for sale to encourage plantings that help conserve the State's natural resources and foster the next generation of forests.

DEC's tree nursery grows more than 50 conifer and hardwood species from local seed sources, creating seedlings that are well-suited to our State's climate. They are available in bundles of 25 or more, plus there are several mixed species packets for those looking for a variety. Seedlings are a minimum of five feet tall and are one to three years old, depending on the species. For more information, including how to order, visit the Spring Seedling Sale webpage on DEC's website. Some species sell out early, so it is recommended to place orders by phone for the most up-to-date availability information.

Applications are now being accepted for the nursery's School Seedling Program. From now until March 31, schools and youth education organizations across New York State may apply to receive up to 50 free tree or shrub seedlings to plant with their students.

The goal of the program is to help instill a sense of environmental stewardship at a young age and set a foundation that will allow students to make informed decisions about the use of natural resources.

All schools, homeschool groups, and any youth education-based organization may apply, provided trees are planted within New York State. Inmate Charged After Attacking Correctional Officer

An inmate at the Rensselaer County Jail has been charged with attempted murder of a correctional officer after an unprovoked incident at the jail on the evening of January 4th.

Matthew W. Fluty, formerly of Brookview Ave in Troy, is alleged to have maliciously attacked an unsuspecting officer, taking his two-way radio, preventing the officer from calling for help. The unidentified officer who was performing his lawful duties at the time of the incident was beaten, overpowered, and strangled into unconsciousness. Fluty left the officer helpless on the upper-level floor of the housing unit containing more than 30 other inmates. Fortunately, the officer's radio had alerted the facility's Control Room and help responded almost immediately. Fluty has been charged with:

- Attempted Murder in the 2nd Degree (A Felony)
- Assault in the 1st Degree (B Felony)
- Robbery in the 1st Degree (B Felony)
- Assault on a Peace Officer (C Felony)

- Strangulation in the 1st Degree (C Felony)

Before this incident, Fluty was being held at RCJ on multiple felony charges and is also pending trial for a May 2021 incident for the crime of "Aggravated Harassment of a Peace Officer" where Fluty is accused of throwing five-day-old urine on a correctional officer. Separate from the above charges, inmate Fluty is also being held on the following unrelated charges out of Rensselaer County: Assault 3rd, Criminal Possession of a Weapon 4th, Criminal Obstruction of Breathing-Apply Pressure, Menacing 2nd with a Weapon, and Criminal Trespass 2nd. Inmate Fluty is also facing pending charges of Obstruction of Governmen-

tal Administration 2nd degree out of Saratoga Springs and Aggravated Harassment 2nd out of Albany City Court.



The Life of George Holcomb

Capt. Holcomb Visits with His Memoir

Tuesday: July 26, 1853: Rainy. Today John F. went to Pittsfield with my horse and wagon and carried seven bushels new potatoes and sold them at 50 cts per. Wednesday: I and Patrick dug potatoes and Mr. J. McFeelie dug 3/4 of a day and then it rained. Today John F. went to Lebanon with my horse and wagon and carried old potatoes and sold where they are to work on the railroad near the gate. He sold them at 25 cts per bushel. Thursday: We dug potatoes, I and Patrick and John Merrils and J. McFeelie worked 3/4 of a day. They three mowed a spell towards night.

Friday: We hayed, I and John F. and Patrick and John Merrils and Jimmy McFeelie, and I paid said Jimmy McFeelie 50 cts cash for this afternoon's work, and Geo P. helped us in the way of changing works.

Saturday: We hayed and finished haying excepting a little on the hill above the woods. Today John Merrils and J. McFeelie worked for me haying towards paying for house rent.

Monday: We hayed for Geo P. in the way of changing works, I and John F. and Patrick and John Merrils, and I credit said Merrils for house rent for the same. Some rainy towards night. Tuesday: John F. did but little for he is unwell. Today cousin Capt Eliah Holcomb came to visit us and stayed, he is selling books, the History of his Seafaring Life. Today some rainy.

Wednesday: I and John F. and Patrick dug potatoes, I am quite lame, I only picked up some small stones. Towards night I took my horse and wagon and went to Lebanon, I sold one bushel new potatoes to Wm Gay for 37 cts cash and I charged one bushel new potatoes to the shoe maker Quaid fifty cts, price agreed which makes one dollar and twenty five cts he now owes me for potatoes.

Thursday: Quite rainy and I am lame, towards night I walked down to the Pierce farm to see Miriam Newton for she is quite unwell. Cousin Eliah Holcomb remains with us, he is unwell and takes medicine.

Friday: This afternoon cousin Eliah Holcomb took my horse and wagon and my wife with him he went to the post office and Mr. Woodard's.

Saturday: Tonight I paid Patrick Rafferty six dollars cash.

Monday: I and John F. and Patrick dug potatoes of mine in the young orchard on the hill, Louisa Merrils helped us, she picked up potatoes nearly half a day and I paid her eleven cts, quite a hard shower towards night.
